Dear Parishioners,

At Christmas we light a candle to show the way. It is an ancient Irish custom, a sign of a Christmas home, a safe house for the priest in troubled times. A sign of hope in sorrow, in bereavement, in separation, in loneliness. A sign of welcome to the stranger, to the immigrant; welcome home from hospital; welcome to the peacemaker and even if some thru death or distance won't be home for Christmas – a penny candle will be lit to renew a flame of love.

Barbara Streisand's dramatic act of lighting a candle all those years ago, at the beginning of her last concert, still remains with me as significant. She dedicated it to the many wise and good people whose lives had been needlessly and violently cut short; leader figures, lights in darkness. It was an inspirational gesture, a kind of gentle rage against the dying of the light. But more than that, it was a kindling of hope, a birth of new light and a looking to the source of light.

Once again Jesus is born into the messiness of our world. The good news is that Christ comes to illuminate that darkness. Christ is the torch. He is the love, a shining light, to light our way.

We too are called to be beams of light. This past year, you the people of God have been a light in the midst of the darkness of the clergy abuse which descended upon the Church, by your fidelity to prayerful practice of your faith. Your response to our offertory increase "ask" last fall was quite remarkable (magnificent). God Bless you for continuing to give in these challenging times.

Parents and grandparents at the school make big sacrifices for Catholic education. Modern scientific study tells us the greatest environment for the formation of your children is not 6th thru 12th grade but Pre-K thru 8th grade.
